Mira is committed to activism and legislative change for metastatic breast cancer, having marched on Washington, held fundraisers and urged congressional leaders to increase research spending for the disease. A mother of four, she is also an advocate for Women's Rights, and has been Goodwill Ambassador Against Human Trafficking for the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime from 2009 through the present.

"In the back of your mind you wonder, 'One day am I going to find a lump, and then my kids are going to have a mother who's dying?' Every woman thinks about this, so we should all be banded together in this sisterhood that this is not acceptable; that this is a priority in our country to eliminate metastatic breast cancer."

Champagne Joy was diagnosed in November 2010 with stage IIIB Invasive Ductal Carcinoma, and was later diagnosed with stage IV metastatic disease in April 2014.




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Rhonda Smith

Dana's mission has been to design and engineer lingerie and loungewear for women throughout their breast cancer journey, starting with diagnosis, then throughout treatment and afterward into their life beyond - including restoring confidence and helping women get back to the bedroom.
